Project Summary	Nevada was awarded over \$222 million to stabilize the child care system and market throughout the COVID-19 Pandemic. Grants were awarded to 786 licensed and license-exempt, registered providers/child care sites (final data) and were paid out in two (2) six-month allotments with all final payments made in June 2023. All first allotments were paid in SFY22.
